



**D. TABLED ITEMS.**

1. **Resolution 08-110, A Resolution Approving Plans, Specifications, Form of Contract and Estimated Cost for the New Recycling Center Project.**

Councilmember Ribich does approve the City's participation in flood housing. Mr. Ribich feels that Public Services are at the heart of the community and responded to the flood and recovery efforts. The new Recycling Center would improve the safety of residents dropping off recyclables mixed with big City equipment. A Public Services Complex would provide efficiency of services and house equipment from inclement weather. The Public Services building has been a top priority of Council's Strategic Planning for 5 to 6 years. Councilmember Liddle voiced his concern with building the recycling center first instead of the Public Services facility in order to maintain equipment. Councilmember Grace stated that the bid from Modern Builders was lower than expected and the building will only cost more later. Administrator Crayne reviewed 2008 Jumpstart Housing Assistance Program where flood victims can get owner occupied rehabilitation/repair assistance, down payment assistance, and interim mortgage assistance. The City may also apply for CDBG assistance. Bremer County Recovery Coalition is working with the Christian Reformed World Relief Committee to provide case management services to all flood victims. Councilmember Ecker stressed that the source of funding to complete the recycling building is already available. Councilmember Vowels urged the Council to wait until the City finds out what the flood costs are. Rick Stensland stated that Modern Builders participated in the flood cleanup efforts and also have ten employees that have been affected by the flood. Mr. Stensland emphasized the need for the City to rebuild and continue to grow. Guest Councilperson Monty Gritzner agreed that the new location would provide a safer environment and asked if it would be modeled after the Cedar Falls Recycling Center. City Engineer Cherry also informed audience members that the new Public Services' location would have two entrances, one for the public and another for staff and equipment. The recycling center would have public parking and stalls to deposit materials. Staff informed Ron Camaratta that the Recycling Center does not provide net revenue but lowers landfill costs. Mr. Camaratta voiced concerns with raising water and sewer rates and to use Recycling money to fix lift stations. Mardi Perry believes that the timing is not right for the recycling center and flood victims have major restorations ahead of them. Paul Pines felt that flooding issues were more important than the recycling center project. Councilmember Lieb questioned whether the City should be doing any projects until FEMA has made their decision on buyouts. City Engineer Cherry informed audience members that the City has been looking at flood mitigation for twelve years. In the past when the City looked at the Inflatable Dam and Dry Run mitigation the Army Corps of Engineers and FEMA both said the costs would not offset the benefit. Both agencies will review the proposals again. Discussion followed on asking the contractor to hold his bid for the project. The notice of letting is presented when the public hearing is set. Mayor Ackerman told audience members that the City cannot ask the contractor to hold his bid. Councilmember Grace suggested that Council review all projects at budget hearings. Mayor Ackerman stated that WSR Schools have 73 new students and that shows that Waverly does have its priorities in order and continues to grow. Councilmember Liddle reminded Council of the petition that was presented against the recycling center project.

City Administrator Crayne stated that plans and costs for flood controls have not been determined at this time.

**F. REGULAR BUSINESS.**

1. **Bremer County Recovery Coalition will provide a preliminary report to Council on community needs resulting from a survey conducted by the Green Shirts.**  
Renee Sedlecek reviewed results of the Christian Reformed World Relief Committee "Green Shirt" Assessment of Bremer County conducted from September 29<sup>th</sup> through October 3<sup>rd</sup>. 103 Bremer County residents have needs, and have completed assessment forms. 12 of the 103 residents had urgent, immediate needs. 91 residents have no needs. And 479 were left call-back flyers when the resident could not be contacted. All buyout list participants were sent postcards and the media was informed. Councilmember Ecker said she informed the Green Shirt team of her neighbor's names that were not home. Ms. Sedlecek informed Mardi Perry that they had requests for 27 furnaces but contractors are in high demand. Bremer County Recovery Coalition will meet with Lutheran Services in Iowa to begin reviewing assessments and to begin the case management process. It is not too late to register for a Green Shirt assessment. The City will be working with the Bremer County Recovery Coalition.
2. **City Administrator Dick Crayne will Report on Flood Assistance Program.**  
City Administrator Crayne reviewed the 2008 Jumpstart Housing Assistance program facilitated through the Iowa Regional Council of Governments. The Jumpstart Program provides three kinds of assistance; owner occupied rehabilitation/repair assistance, down payment assistance, and interim mortgage assistance. Mortgage assistance would be up to \$1,000 per month up to 12 months maximum, repair assistance would be up to \$50,000 less what has been paid out. Loan reimbursement up to \$50,000 if you live in the residence 5 years otherwise property owners have to return said loan. Down payment assistance is for purchase of replacement housing for a not-to-exceed figure of \$50,000. INRCOG is facilitating the applications and it is on a first come first serve basis. The only requirement is that you have to be registered with FEMA. Flood victims can also receive energy efficient assistance. Small Business Recovery would be equivalent to 25% of the disaster loan to a maximum of \$50,000. Business owners are urged to contact INRCOG.



7. **Resolution 08-133, A Resolution Proposing the Vacation and Deeding of 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue NW Between 1<sup>st</sup> Street NW and 2<sup>nd</sup> Street NW for St. Paul's Lutheran Church and School.**

Sally Schneider informed Council that St. Paul's Lutheran Church and School are seeking to use 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue NW from 1<sup>st</sup> Street NW to 2<sup>nd</sup> Street NW to create a campus atmosphere. Ms. Schneider stated that the street is currently barricaded during school hours and with growth in enrollment there is a demand for a multipurpose room and additional classrooms. Council was concerned with handicap parking, drop-off lanes and whether a fire truck could get to the buildings. St. Paul's will have to maintain the sewer easement as part of the agreement with the City.

8. **Proposal from Deb Turnball that the City of Waverly Consider Special Policy Guidelines for Building Services for Structures Impacted by 2008 Flooding.**

Deb Turnball stated that it has become increasingly clear that our local contractors are unable to handle the volume of work needed in the aftermath of the flood and everyday that passes brings the onset of cold weather closer. Flood victims need to get back into their homes and have a need to bring in out of state contractors to put in their furnaces. Contractors in Waverly need to obtain licenses and permits for installation of furnaces, hot water heaters, etc.

Doug Bird of Bremer County Building and Zoning reviewed the fee structure and told the Council that the City Ordinance would have to be amended to waive fees. License fees

are \$45.00 for a contractor and \$25.00 per employee. License testing costs are \$75.00. After further discussion, staff will notify local electrical and plumbing contractors of said proposal.

Mayor Ackerman instructed staff to put the Waverly Citizens United, Inc.'s resolution on the agenda for the next meeting.
